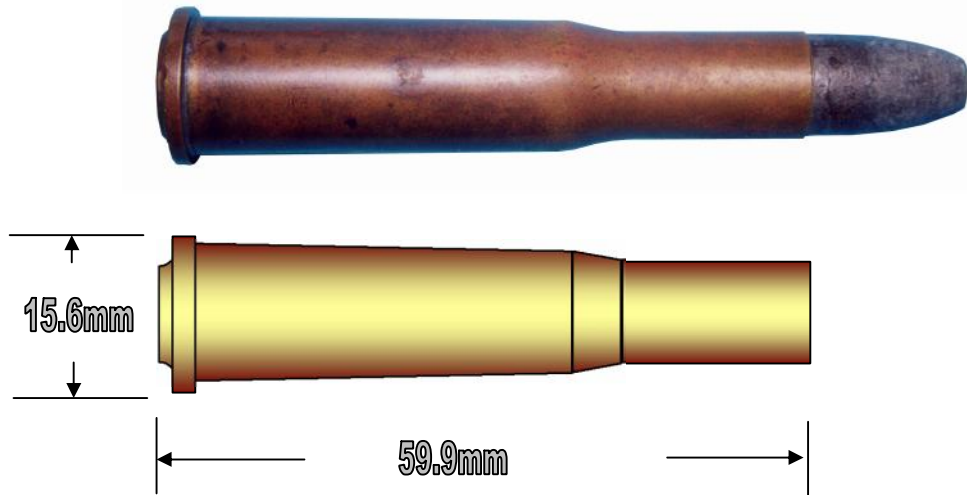


# 10.15x61R JARMANN

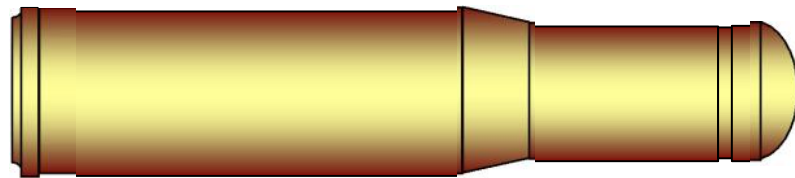


Norway adopted this cartridge in 1882 for use in a single shot rifle that was retained in service until 1894. Although officially replaced at that time by the then newer and smaller calibres coming into service 10.15mm ammunition production was continued until c1950. The cartridge was used in the M1884 Jarmann rifle, the Jarmann repeating rifle and the Nordenfelt machine gun.

## Cartridges produced for this calibre.

- A short range cartridge with a spherical lead bullet.
- A blank with a natural wood bullet.
- A blank with a natural wood bullet and a corrugated case.
- A blank with a cork sealed mouth.
- A dummy with a red wood bullet.
- A dummy with a corrugated case.

Some early smoothbore Model 1881 weapons were modified to launch harpoons and were designated the “Kongsberg Harpoon rifle, M1948”. The weapon used a modified Jarmann cartridge with a roll crimp holding a brass cup in place to act as a gas check. A label pasted over the base showing the load in grams indicated the loading of the cartridge.
